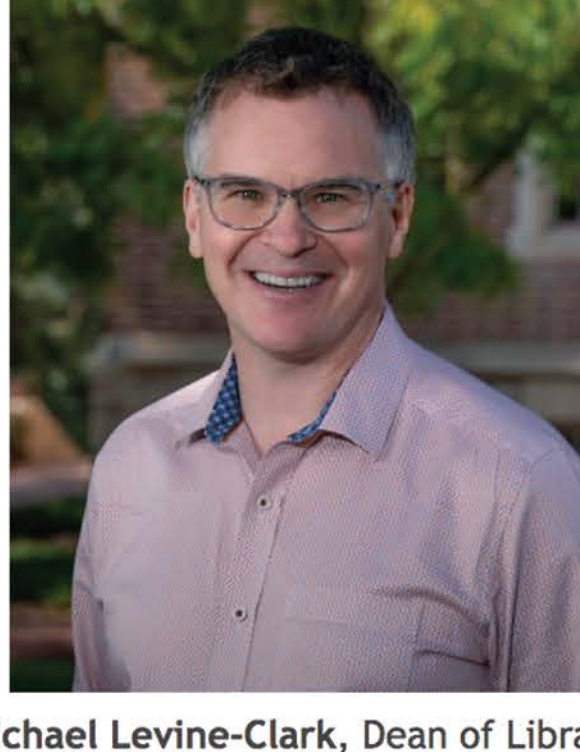
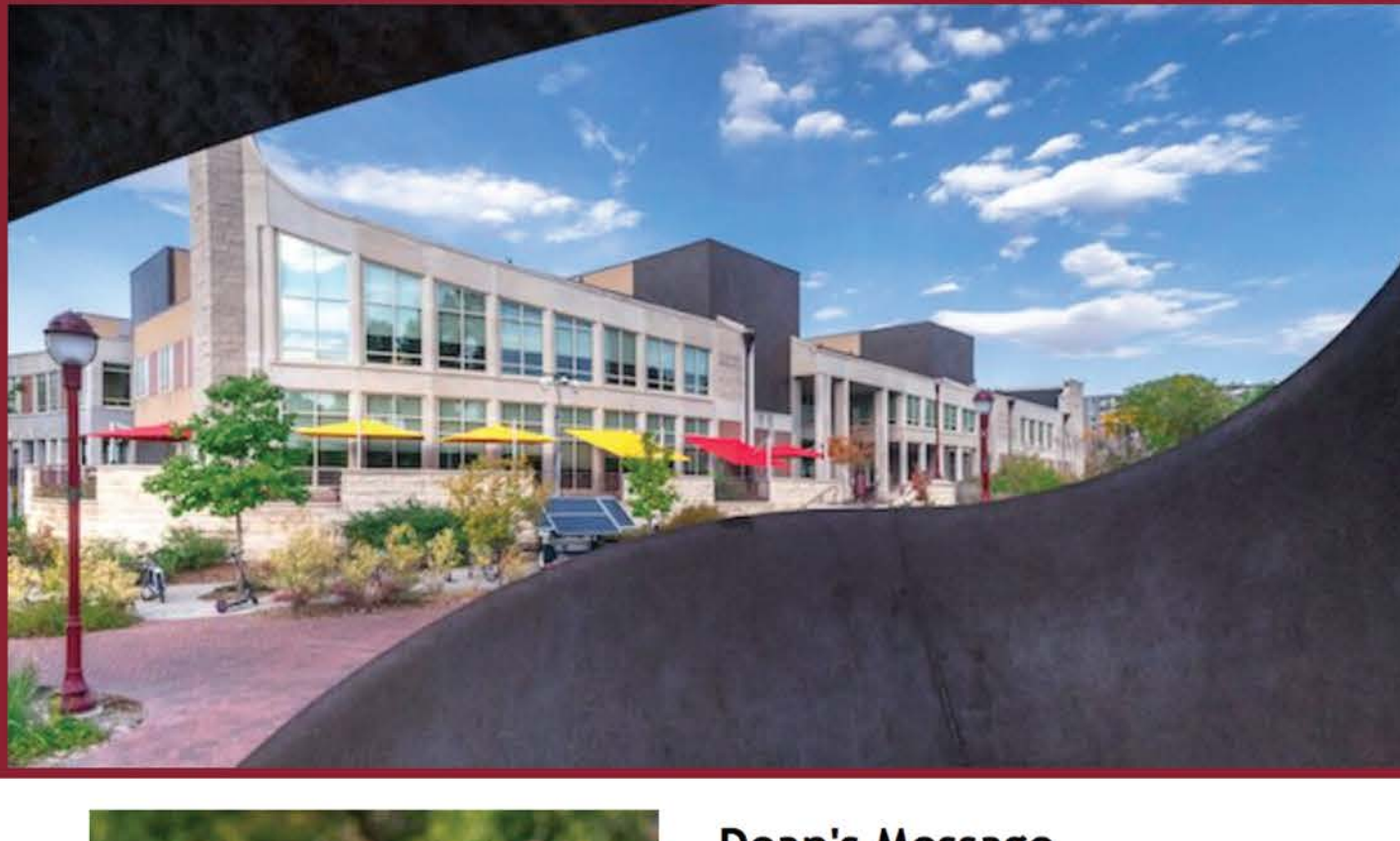

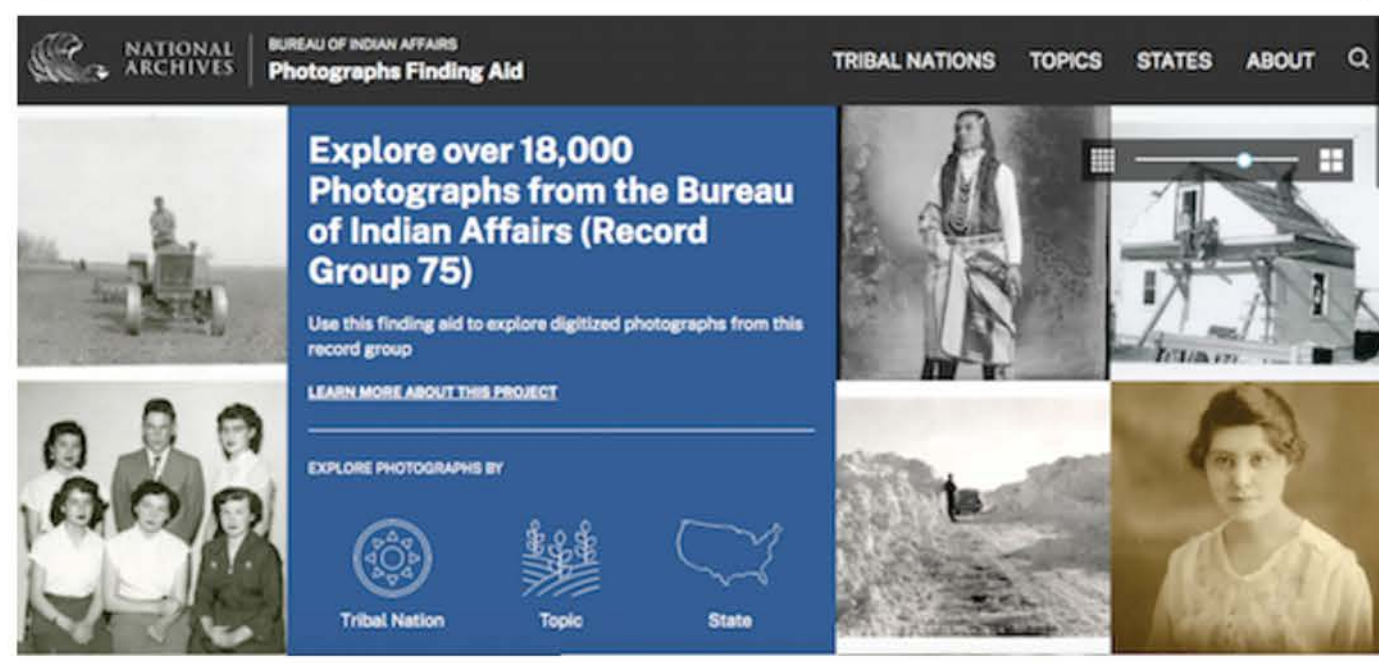


## Dean's Message

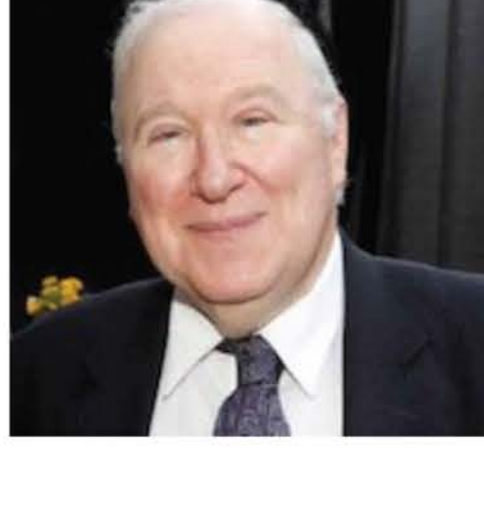


## DU librarians work with National Archives

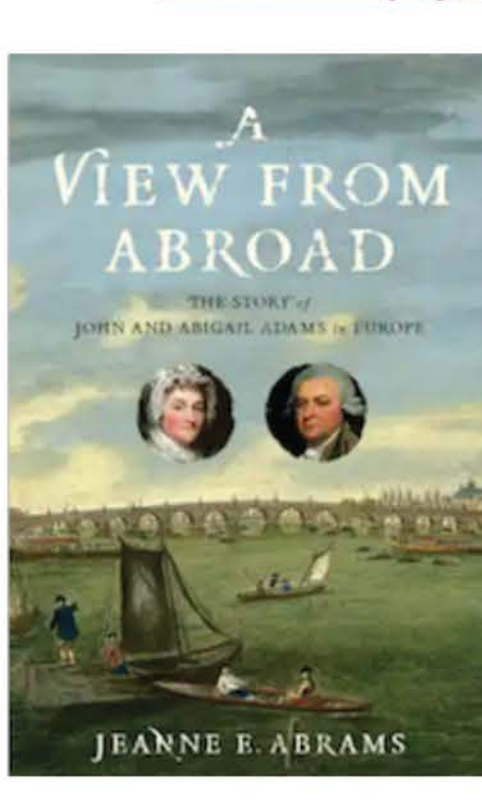
## 2020 - 2021 University Library Association lecture series

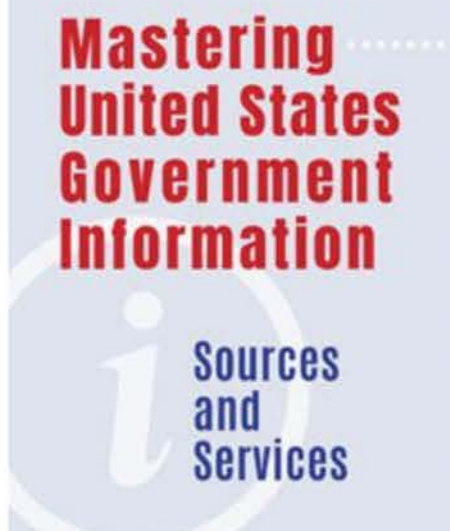


## New book by Jeanne Abrams

*A VIEW FROM ABROAD, The Story of John and Abigail Adams in Europe* by Jeanne Abrams is newly published by NYU Press. It reveals how the journeys of John and Abigail Adams from 1778 through 1788 in Europe changed the course of their intellectual, political, and cultural development—transforming the couple from provincials to sophisticated world travelers—and strengthened their loyalty to America. Professor Abrams is Curator of the Beck Archives.

*Mastering United States Government Information: Sources and Services* (Libraries, 2020), grew out of Chris Brown's years of reference work and teaching in the DU library school program. Readers will benefit from learning how to access the primary documents of their government, including congressional publications, legislative histories, presidential issuances, statistical and census data, patents, trademarks, and more. 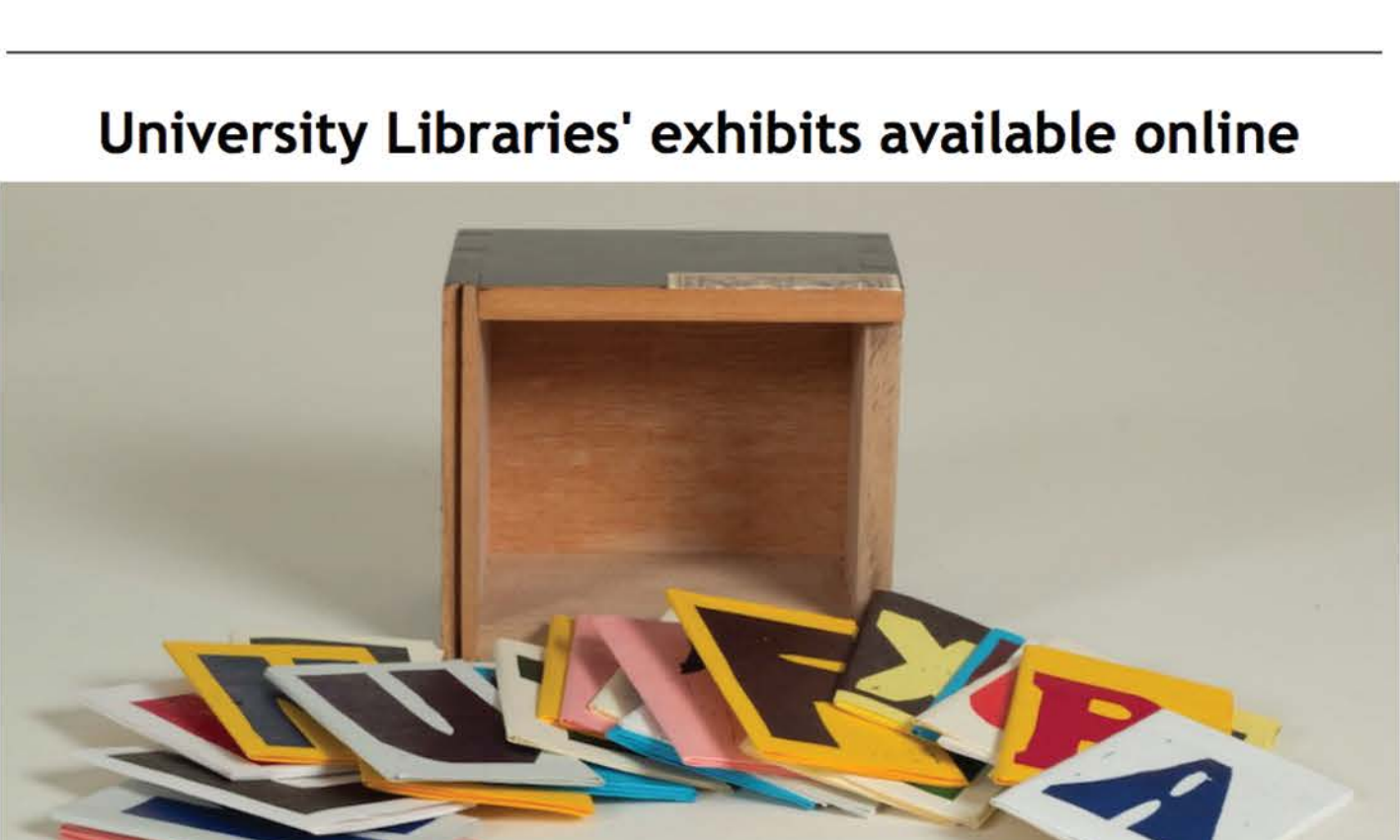
